The prestigious *Professional Actor Training Program* (PATP) is a three-year conservatory program leading to a Master of Fine Arts degree, and is designed to prepare students for careers in the professional theatre. The rigorous training includes work in a range of types and styles of performance, including non-realistic, realistic, classical and contemporary plays. The overall aim of the

program is to provide students with the practical skills necessary to clearly and fully reveal their artistic ideas--skills which serve to challenge, shape, and strengthen their own individual acting processes. The PATP is consistently ranked among the very best graduate training programs in the nation.

The faculty is world-renowned – PATP instructors, professionals themselves, are recognized experts and innovators of their respective fields. The acting curriculum



accordingly reflects a diversity of instruction that mixes the very best of traditional training techniques with the most promising of experimental approaches. As a result, School of Drama graduates enter into the profession with a great array of studio training, including Suzuki and Alexander techniques (movement), Linklater and Skinner (voice and speech), and Stanislavsky (acting technique). Other courses prepare students in a number of necessary fields such as stage combat, dance, dialects, singing, text analysis and dramatic action.

Production Notes

About the Author and the Work:

Salman Rushdie is a novelist, playwright, and critic of the highest international reputation. His works have garnered nearly every possible recognition, including two Whitbread Novel Awards, the Austrian State Prize for European Literature, Switzerland's Prix Colette, and a British Book Award: in 1993 he was awarded the "Booker of Bookers" Award



(celebrating twenty-five years of the Booker Award for Fiction) for *Midnight's Children*. Rushdie's 1988 book, *The Satanic Verses*, led to accusations of blasphemy against Islam, and the Iranian leadership issued a death fatwa against him. He has since remained in hiding under protection of the British government.

Haroun and the Sea of Stories, a bedtime parable about the powers and perils of story-telling, won the 1990 Writers' Guild Award for Best Children's Book. The work was adapted for the stage in 1998 and presented by London's Royal National Theatre. Rushdie has adapted only one other of his novels, Midnight's Children, for the stage.

Rushdie once remarked on his own storytelling: "It seems to me, more and more, that the fictional project on which I've been involved ever since I began Midnight's Children back in 1975 is one of self-definition. That novel, Shame, and The Satanic Verses strike me as an attempt to come to terms with the various component parts of myself - countries, memories, histories, families, gods. First the writer invents the books; then, perhaps, the books invent the writer."

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Salman Rushdie wrote *Haroun and the Sea of Stories* for his son. As a storyteller whose stories had put his life profoundly in danger, he needed, perhaps, to justify for his son the question that haunts Haroun: "What's the use of stories that aren't even true?" And, I believe, answer it he does in the most imaginative and compelling of fashions. This imaginative journey knows no limits but our own boundaries ... which makes *Haroun* an amazing novel and a fascinatingly challenging play.

I would like to thank and acknowledge the tremendous creativity that the entire cast, staff and wonderful design team have shown in bringing this complex and impossible world (or, worlds, rather...) to life. Now, as an act of collective imagination, it needs only you to take it the rest of way, to help "piece out our imperfections with your thoughts," as Shakespeare says. And if we all do our part, then we may just begin to see what the use of stories that "aren't even true" might be.

About the Director

Aaron Posner is the School of Drama's Distinguished Visiting Director for this production of *Haroun and the Sea of Stories*. He is the cofounder and former artistic director of Philadelphia's award-winning Arden Theatre Company, where he has directed over 40 productions in the last 17 years.

Mr. Posner specializes in staging works of literature, and his own adaptations include *Who Am I This Time?* by Kurt Vonnegut, Jr., *What Ho, Jeeves* by P.G. Wodehouse, *Ellen Foster* by Kaye Gibbons, and *Third & Indiana* by Steve Lopez. His adaptation, with Chaim Potok, of *The Chosen* won the 1999 Barrymore Award for Best New Play and was recently seen at the Seattle Repertory Theatre.

An Eisenhower Fellow, Mr. Posner also teaches acting and directing nationally, and is a philanthropic consultant.
