



# Program Spotlight: Bachelor of Arts

This production of *The Who's Tommy* is one of many University of Washington School of Drama productions showcasing the talents of our nationally-ranked Bachelor of Arts in Drama Program. The BA program is dedicated to providing a well-rounded major within a liberal arts context. Undergraduate majors are required to complete core courses in acting, design and technical theatre, theatre history, dramatic literature, and performance criticism. Upper-level electives include intermediate and advanced acting, design, technical theatre, stage management and directing. Drama majors work with the School's internationally acclaimed faculty, graduate students, theatre professionals and visiting artists from around the world.

Aside from the opportunities presented in the School of Drama main stage season, the undergraduates have a strong reputation for producing and creating their own works, "The Undergraduate Theater Society", "Once Upon a Weekend" and the improv troupe "The Collective" are just three examples of the many student-run organizations dedicated to the exploration of the theatrical process outside the classroom. The **Undergraduate Theater Society** (UTS) manages and produces a full season of plays in the Cabaret Theatre located in Hutchinson Hall.



With literally hundreds of members, UTS is the largest student organization within

the School and last year was recognized by the School as the official producing company of the undergraduates. "Once Upon A Weekend" is a short play festival of original works that is written, directed and performed by students over the course of a single weekend. "The Collective" is a self-sustaining improvisation troupe whose members have graduated to Jet City Improv as well as Unexpected Productions. As a result of these hands-on experiences in theatre making, many undergraduates go on to form professional production companies such as Defibrillator, PSST Street Theatre and The Washington Ensemble Theatre, to name a few, continuing to create work in the Seattle community and beyond.

### **Actor's Notes**

In 1968, Pete Townshend's band The Who had become hugely successful in the UK through their dynamic live shows and landmark albums such as 1965's *My Generation*. By 1968, however, years of stardom had worn on Townshend. Disillusioned with the promises of his generation, Townshend's rejection of psychedelic drugs and subsequent embrace of mysticism led him to begin work on a concept 'rock opera' based on the idea of different states of consciousness.

Townshend's desire to create a metaphor for the boundaries of human consciousness eventually led him to the creation of the character Tommy, after whom the album was eventually named. In Townshend's words, "There was a parallel within the shape of the autistic child, so the hero had to be deaf, dumb, and blind so that seen from our limited point of view, his limitations would be symbolic of our own."

With the initial concept in place, the rest of The Who jumped on board and began to make rock history. Though Townshend was the primary songwriter, other members made their own contributions, including "Fiddle About" and "Cousin Kevin" by bassist John Entwistle and "Tommy's Holiday Camp" by drummer Keith Moon. The initial recording sessions were time-consuming and put the band deeply in debt, but the end result was hailed as a rock masterpiece, albeit an ambiguous and somewhat chaotic one. Strangely enough, the song "Pinball Wizard" was hastily written by Townshend to secure a favorable album review from an influential rock critic known to be a pinball fanatic. Though Townshend thought it was one of the worst songs he had ever written, it went on to become a hit single and today is still the most recognizable song from the original Tommy album, which was released in 1969 to critical acclaim on both sides of the Atlantic.

In 1991, director Des McAnuff was drafted to collaborate with Townshend on a stage adaptation for Tommy, which premiered at the La Jolla Playhouse in 1992. In the process of adapting Tommy for the stage, McAnuff and Townshend altered the original song order to create a more consistent narrative and fleshed out the story with new music, notably, "I Believe My Own Eyes". The production opened on Broadway in the spring of 1993, where it won 5 Tony Awards and launched a touring production that ran for several years and has since been performed all across the United States and Europe.

Thirty-seven years later, this story has found its way into my lap, curious and fresh as ever. After living inside the skin of the Pinball Messiah for awhile, the initial question still lingers: What is the story of Tommy about? Family? Celebrity? Acceptance? In the past two months I have come to believe that is a combination of all three and more - it seems that the power of this story is that it holds a different meaning for everyone, and that no one interpretation is any more correct than another. Whatever your take on it may be, it is my pleasure to welcome you along on our Amazing Journey!

### Director's Notes

The Who's Tommy is a work of art(?)/hubris(?)/expression(?) that had a huge impact when it was released in 1969. It remains one of the most influential and important rock albums ever made. It is often called the first rock opera and concept album.

Twenty-three years after its initial release, Pete Townshend and Des McAnuff adapted the album into a large-scale musical.

There is not much of a story—Tommy witnesses a homicide, loses sight, hearing and speech, discovers pinball and becomes famous—the music is inconsistent, and no discernible lesson to be learned. Why, then, has Tommy had such an impact? I looked for this answer through the entirety of the rehearsal process and am unable to articulate the reason.

Pete Townshend and The Who created something that hits its audience on an inexplicable level. It is moving and viscerally affective. It makes those who see/hear it view life in a new way. It acts as **art** should—as something that is indescribably poignant and impossible to live without.

Please enjoy our version of *The Who's Tommy*.
