

FROM THE DIRECTOR

'We all like great old plays, like Shakespeare wrote, And want to do them well and often, too. But Shakespeare wrote for his time so we vote That these old plays can also be done new.' -Tiffany, A U-Dubber Night's Dream

For those of you familiar with Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream, you will certainly recognize the original play within tonight's adaptation. But you'll also notice some significant departures: our play isn't set in ancient Athens; it's set in 2010; just before commencement at the Jones Playhouse and on Foster Island across Lake Washington. Most significantly perhaps is that Alison Carey's adaptation does not have magical fairies manipulating the course of human events. As is increasingly common in our modern lives, it is humans who manipulate the events in this story.

No doubt, some fans of Shakespeare may ask: 'why adapt such a masterful author?' The Elizabethan theatre is considered to be one of the 'golden eras' of drama because it was so popular, not just with the educated nobility, but also with the common people of that culture. The production you will see tonight was inspired by that widespread appeal that Shakespeare enjoyed. It was conceived four years ago as an idea to make theatre in that same spirit: a play that would appeal to people across age, race, and social backgrounds. Most of all, we wanted it to directly reflect the lives of people on this campus.

We began with only a project title: The Campus-wide, Collaborative Theatre Project (CCTP). In 2006 we invited members of Cornerstone Theater in Los Angeles to come to Seattle and host a weekend training seminar on 'Community-based Theatre.' Soon after that a committee of students and faculty decided to seek out members of five campus communities including first generation, ROTC, returning students, young scholars, and student athletes. Over the next few years we sat with these students, talked about their affiliations with their communities, and their decision to come to UW at this point in their lives. Those conversations led us to choosing this Shakespearean comedy and adapting it to UW student life. Once written, the marvelously talented company was assembled from members of the five communities along with students from the School of Drama. Your participation as an audience member is the final step of this 'alchemy' and we trust that even without fairies, you will find tonight's production transforming and enchanting. Enjoy the show!
