ABOUT THE DIRECTOR

Desdemona Chiang is a freelance stage director, Co-Founder of Azeotrope (Seattle) and Associate Artistic Director of Impact Theatre (Berkeley). Her directing credits include: Crowded Fire Theatre Company, Azeotrope, Impact Theatre, FringeNYC, Playwrights Foundation, Golden Thread Productions, Washington Ensemble Theatre, Unicycle Collective, SIS Productions, and Cornish College of the Arts. She's a previous Drama League Directing Fellow, TCG Young Leader of Color, 2012 Gregory Award winner for Outstanding Director, and member of the Lincoln Center Theater Directors Lab and Directors Lab West. She received her MFA in Directing from the University of Washington School of Drama in 2009.

ABOUT THE PLAYWRIGHT

Tom Stoppard is a prolific Czech-born British playwright known for his linguistic and philosophical work. Stoppard has written for TV, radio, film, and stage, and is well known for his stage plays Arcadia, The Coast of Utopia, The Real Thing, Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead, and many more. Stoppard wrote The Real Inspector Hound in the early 1960s as a parody of the stereotypical murder mysteries loved by many, including the Agathie Christie play The Mousetrap. The Real Inspector Hound explores the theme of 'play within a play,' in addition to the ideas of free will and fate, through an often absurd and satirical lens.

INSIGHTS

Most playwrights who have suffered indignities at the hands of critics -- and who has not? -- lie awake at one time or another inventing clever forms of revenge and then think the better of it in the morning.

In this broad swipe at the enemy, two critics of dubious stripe, Birdboot and Moon, bumble their way through and finally into the play they are supposed to be reviewing, to find in the end that an ignominious fate awaits. Together, they cover the spectrum of critical response: the highbrow Moon looking for "the nature of identity," while the lowbrow Birdboot throws himself on a box of Black Magic chocolates and tries to guess who the murderer is. In his romp through commonplace, Mr. Stoppard -- who once worked as a critic himself -- gives Moon lines like this: "There are moments, and I would not begrudge it this, when the play, if we can call it that, and I think on balance we can, aligns itself uncompromisingly on the side of life." - Angeline Goreau, The New York Times
